Community Hub Update

Campbell Park Parish Council

As you will be aware from the last magazine, we were in the process of submitting a planning application to Milton Keynes Council to start the formal process in seeking permission to demolish the existing building (the former Springfield pub) to clear the plot in readiness for the next stage of the Hub development. This planning application also sought outline permission for the construction of the Community Hub.

We are pleased to see that a number of positive comments were lodged with Milton Keynes Council, and no objections raised to this application. MK Councils decision on this application is expected imminently.

Ecology Survey

Due to outcome of the ecology surveys and the possibility identified of bats hibernating in the building currently, we have had to delay our plans to demolish the building until the beginning of March (subject to received planning permission to do so). For the protection of the bats, this is considered a safe time to demolish. So, we will mobilise our appointed demolition contractors accordingly and hope to have the site cleared by Easter.

As we start to develop the detailed plans and building designs for the Community Hub, community engagement and consultation with our residents will be a key part of the process. Please look

out on our website and social media for details of our consultation event/s.

Resident input will be critical in making sure that the services the new Hub will deliver best match the community needs across all of our estates. The Hub will be the first purposebuilt property of its type in Milton Keynes, with the Parish Council making an investment of around £1.8m into its construction, to achieve this.

To help fund the project, Campbell Park Parish Council made the decision to apply to the Public Works Loan Board for up to £1.5m. The Public Works Loan Board is a statutory body of the Government which provides loans to local authorities such as town & parish councils to enable them to invest in their communities. The repayments of this loan will be funded from within the existing budget, and it is not our intention to increase the precept for this.

Our main aim is to provide a community building that residents can be proud of and increasingly value through the services and initiatives that it delivers. If the past eighteen months have taught us one thing, its that we need to ensure that the plans that we make are sufficiently flexible to meet your ever-changing needs for many years to come.

We will be holding a consultation event in late February 2022, please see next magazine for details

Campbell Park Parish Council (CPPC) controls and manages community centres in Oldbrook (next to Oldbrook First School) and Springfield (next to the One Stop Shop). Results of 2022-2023 Budget/Precept Level Consultation

Campbell Park Parish Council

Thank you to everyone that participated in this year's annual budget/precept consultation.
We received over 550 responses - which was great!

We are grateful that, year on year, you continue to take the time to complete this consultation and provide us with responses to the questions we ask you. **The feedback we receive is so valuable to us** to ensure that our plans for the coming year reflect what is important to you.

This year's consultation asked you to prioritise issues in your area. **The overwhelming priority** for our residents was the Parish-wide landscaping service, with the frequency of Street Cleansing service (currently provided by MKC) also identified as being of high importance to you.

In terms of **landscaping**, you told us that the landscape maintenance to alleyways and access routes, and sightlines on roadways were the top priorities.

Your feedback regarding your priorities for the development of the **Community Hub** are on page 3.



We also asked you to comment on the **2022/23 income** of the parish council and the % increase you think would be appropriate for the 2022/23 Precept.

The majority of respondents (54.5%) told us that it would be appropriate to increase the Precept by 1% to 5%.

The Trustees had their AGM on the 20th of September 2021 and have re-elected the Chairman Karl Kavarana and Val Dixon as Vice Chair. The Grant applications for this year were 21 in numbers. All the existing trustees were re-elected. There were apologies from Chrispina Odunewu and accepted.

Geoff Taylor Trust has received the grant from Campbell Park Parish Council which allows the trust to make the awards. The number of applications this year meant that the **grants given out were £500** as a Maximum amount.

Some of the applicants have had grants over the last few years towards their studies. Grants given out were across the parish of Campbell Park.

The level of the applications was good and supporting information helps the trustees when making the awards.

The trustees always like feedback from previous applications and how the grants had helped towards their studies and thanking the trustees.

The trustees when making the awards do ask about the feedback on how well the applications are doing from the previous year.

The **total amount for grant** applications this year to be given out by the trust will be for £10,500. The Trust also agreed to seek funds else where to support the charity.

The Trustees would like to thank again the Campbell Park Parish Council for its support over the years for the grant funding to enable the grants to be paid out. And to allow the trustees to use the meeting place for their AGM.

CHAPMAN'S EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION (Chapman's Charity-Founded 1786)

The Trustees had their Annual AGM at Ravenstone Community Centre on the 2nd of October 2021, which alternates with Woolstone and Ravenstone every other year.

The election of the chairperson was Christa Pumfrey the vicar of Ravenstone, the Membership of the committee was approved, and the Minutes of the video meeting on the 10th of October 2020 were agreed. All other Trustee's remain the same. The Question has been asked about the village hall deeds and to apply to the land registry for copies.

The committee approved the Clause 16 amounts of £250 payments which are for Sunday schools in Ravenstone and Stoke Goldington and asked for an update on last year's grant to the Woolstone church before any payments would be made for this year. The committee had a report from the Village Hall Management of Ravenstone which the Charity owns and supports for repairs and updating the hall fabric of the Hall. The question of the heating was raised as there are some signs of dampness to the building and to apply if they agree to the trust for the funding. Also, they are looking to upgrade the dryers in the toilets.

Grant applications to the Charity for this year were 15. And are spread across the Villages from Ravenstone, Stoke Goldington, Woolstone, The Funding of the Grants comes from the investments made by the Charity. The total amount spent for this year was just under £9,000 for the grants to the applicants the committee when looking at the applications looks at where the help is most needed by the applicants.

The committee approved the accounts and to reappoint the auditors and acknowledge the Charity Commission returns 2020.

The committee noted the letters of thanks received for grants for 2020 the meeting for next year takes place in Woolstone community Centre.

Mayor Presents Laptops to Fishermead School & Community Centre

At a celebration breakfast organised by Citizens:mk and hosted by Fishermead Trinity Community Centre, MK Mayor Mohammed Khan presented community leaders with 35 laptops.

The devices were donated by **Veritas Digital**, an organisation which collects large companies' redundant devices and repurposes them for use by people who are digitally excluded. 30 devices will be used by pupils of Jubilee Wood Primary School and 5 will be used to start an internet café at Trinity Centre.

This initiative follows a **listening campaign** involving 61 residents. 41% had trouble accessing the internet and 59% said they would use the internet cafe.

A survey of school pupils showed 114 pupils can't access devices at home for school work. "What we have received will make a huge difference to them," said head teacher Matt O'Brien. "It's good to work alongside others who take pride in the community and want to make it as good as possible for our children."

To celebrate the handover, 28 children from Willows First School sang 'Together in Electric Dreams' to great applause. Cllr Mohammed Khan, Mayor of Milton Keynes, presenting 5 laptops and a partnership certificate to Heinz Elbers, Trinity Centre trustee.



Local resident Ophelia Cole, Chair of Trinity Centre
Management Committee,
who has been trained by
Citizens:mk, said: "I strongly
believe in working with institutions
who contribute towards developing
residents and changing the negative
press about Fishermead. It is my
hope that this centre will one day
become the hub where all residents
meet to support and encourage each
other, where those who are strong
give a helping hand to those who
are struggling."

The event was also attended by Debbie Gockelen, Assistant Principal of MK Academy secondary school, who said: "Our work with the community through Citizens:mk has encouraged active citizenship and empowered our students to make a difference in their communities. It's good to be here and see other schools getting together to support digital inclusion."

Rev Ian Herbert, a Trinity
Centre trustee, said: "We need
to reach out to residents who are
digitally excluded. Working together
with schools, faith and other
community groups, we can."

Landscape Update

Campbell Park Parish Council

The Landscape Team have been incredibly busy over the summer trying to keep up with the excessive growth caused by the warm and wet periods we experienced. As well as their normal maintenance programme, they have also been attending to a range of issues reported.

Final Cut

We will be completing one final grass cut this year so we can go into winter with lovely short grass to look tidy.

We are now moving into the winter maintenance schedule. We have begun with work in Fishermead and we will then move onto Oldbrook, Springfield, Woolstone and Willen. Each estate is allocated a set amount of time, which will take us up to April.





Fishermead & Oldbrook

The work on Fishermead will include clearing and cutting back shrubbery up and down the main roads. In Oldbrook we will be clearing sightlines on the roads, courtyards and undertaking work in the playparks.

Springfield, Woolstone and Willen

In Springfield we will be concentrating on footpath clearance, attending to the shrubbery around Springfield Court and clearing sightlines. When we move on to Woolstone we will be attending to the big hedge lines, clearing sightlines and undertaking some clearance work on the car park at the Local Park and finally in Willen we will be clearing sightlines, crown lifting some trees and clearing footpaths.

On each estate, approximately a week is allocated to attend to reports made by residents about specific landscaping issues so we will attend to as many as we can during these periods.

Our winter maintenance schedule has taken into account resident responses to the landscape section of our Annual Consultation, so thank you for responding in such large numbers.







Alleys and Access Paths

Having taken over the devolved landscape service a little over 18 months ago, a reasonable resident expectation is that the Parish Council are responsible for maintaining all landscaped areas – the reality is that responsibility across the Parish is split between ourselves, the Parks Trust, Milton Keynes Council (in limited situations) and private landowners.

We always strive to deliver the best landscaping outcome that we can, but know that sometimes your expectations are different. One limitation we face is the maintenance of areas that are not part of our contract, but at the same time do not have a regular maintenance regime in pace for their upkeep. Some of the alleys and access paths in Fishermead are good examples, with their condition becoming increasingly of concern to you.

We are in discussion with Milton Keynes Council about the best way to tackle the issue, including putting a formal fix in place, so will keep you updated with any developments. Whilst investigating the alley issue, it has become evident that overgrown landscaping from the rear of some houses is adding to the problem, so clearly there is a part for us all to play in improving our patch to ensure that it is the best it can be.

Additional Resources

We knew that taking over the devolved landscape service was likely to be one of the biggest challenges that we had ever faced, and that improving neglected areas was not going to be a quick job, with some benefits needing several years before they are felt. Reflecting on the delivery of our first winter maintenance schedule, we have added more seasonal resource and expanded our team for this coming winter, including the voluntary services of Cllr Ray Golding. Councillor Golding represents Oldbrook Ward, but will be working with the team throughout the Parish until next March.

We are also exploring

the possibility of other Councillors volunteering with the team, with a real determination by all to turn the landscaping around and maintaining it in a condition that we can all be proud of.

MK East Development Update

Campbell Park Parish Council

Following our consultation in May with residents about the original highway proposals, (the results of which were shared with the Developer and informed our formal response to MK Council on the application) and alongside feedback the Developers, Berkeley St James, received at the Willen Public Meeting in July Berkeley St James agreed to re-look at their proposals and make some amendments to the highway plans.

On behalf of Campbell Park
Parish Council, Councillor Phillip
Dunn actively engaged with the
Developers to ensure that the
outcome of the consultation
was reflected in the changes
that were made.

This resulted in the Berkeley St James presenting their amended proposal to residents at a Public Meeting on 14th September at Willen Pavilion.

Following the Public Meeting, Campbell Park Parish Council undertook a further consultation with Willen residents to gauge feelings across Willen on the amended proposals.

We hand delivered the consultation questionnaire to



every home in Willen (nearly 600) and, again, received an excellent response rate with just under 100 replies received.

Thank you very much for taking the time to participate!

The responses were presented to our Planning, Infrastructure and Transport Committee. The responses received showed a clear majority in support of the closure of Carleton Gate.

This data informed the Parish Councils formal response to Milton Keynes Council to support the amended planning application and the proposed closure of Carleton Gate.

We now await the outcome of Milton Keynes Councils consideration of this application later in the year.

Members of the public who wish to speak at the Development Control Committee meeting at Milton Keynes Council when this application is decided can do so.

On the 27th of August Bloor Homes distributed a leaflet regarding their proposed development covering the building up to 800 dwellings, which includes public open space, sports pitches, a local centre and a primary school. Residents were encouraged to visit the website www. willenroadeast.co.uk and provide feedback by 14th September.

The third and final project of the MK East development is Newlands Property Development, consisting of two large warehouses on the land

bordered by Willen Road, H3 Monks Way and the M1. The work also includes improvement to Willen Road and the Marsh End Roundabout. The project is called Caldecote Farm. In July this year Newlands Property Development distributed a leaflet regarding their proposed development and directed Residents to their website www.cadecotefarm.co.uk and requested feedback by 19th July. On the 23rd September Newlands Property Development published their outline application, which can be viewed on the MK Council website


Children in **Year 2** have been learning about the Great Fire of London. They have learnt how the fire started, how the fire spread so quickly and which historical figures gave accounts during this time.




PETS'S CORNER






