Chair of Councils Report 2020/2021

Campbell Park Parish Council

A year of Covid 19 Regulations and Lockdowns has meant very much reduced activity in our Community Centres, the closure of the Parish Office to all but essential staff, no physical Council meetings and no in person contact with residents through organised events.

Council meetings were very quickly arranged through Microsoft Teams as part of Office 365 which we transferred over to as quickly as we could. All of our Councillors and Officers very quickly learnt what a superb platform Teams is and soon became accustomed to meeting virtually. We have also streamed our meetings on our You Tube Channel as often as possible and when the technology enabled us to do so. Council may well be forced back to in person meetings from May 7th due to Central Government not extending the regulations. I am surprised that this is the case as many Councils have seen more Councillor and Resident involvement in meetings over the year.

Both of our Community Centres were totally closed for a very long period at the start of the Covid Pandemic meaning a big dip in income to the Parish. We did however receive a grant from MKC for income lost supplied by the Government.

Helping in the Community

Many Councillors have had to shield during the Pandemic but those that could were busy with Foodbank deliveries and Prescription pick ups and deliveries to residents who could not leave their homes. We also delivered hot meals supplied by



Melting Pot to families in the CPPC area. We allowed Melting Pot free use of the Springfield Centre where they were producing upwards of 250 meals once a week for families of the Borough.

Landscape Service

If a Parish Council was starting a new Devolved Landscape Service at any time then it wouldn't want it during a Pandemic, but that's exactly the position CPPC found ourselves in, starting ours on April 1st 2020. I do have to thank the team for the massive effort they made in ensuring the service ran as we wished. Even with staff shortages due to isolation etc the Parish were complemented by so many residents on how good our grassed areas looked throughout the summer. The team have also managed to improve so many ugly and unkept areas of shrubbery around the Parish that have not been touched for several years. It will take another two winter cuts to deal with the whole area.

Still Working for you

Although the Parish Office has been closed and many Officers have worked from home where they could, it hasn't meant they have sat back and not been working to our plan during these difficult times. Our finances have still been managed, Council and Committee meetings have taken place, our centres have been looked after and made Covid



safe throughout, we have worked with MKC to deal with fly tipping and ensuring evidence, where found, has been passed to MKC Enforcement Officers, our own land has been kept litter and dog waste free and of course we have worked with Thames Valley Police when we have needed to. During this year we finally crossed the hurdle of acquiring the Springfield Pub site and have started the process of redeveloping the site into our Parish Community Hub.

I wish to close with my personal thanks to you the residents for supporting CPPC through this difficult year, and to all of the Councillors and Staff for continuing to support the residents of the Parish. Hopefully at some point in our 2021/2022 Council year we will all be able to come together at the end of this horrible Pandemic.

Local charity St Marks MK tells us about their St Marks Meals Project

"6 years ago a head teacher from within the Campbell Park
Parish Council area told us that they kept a toaster desk to
provide breakfast for the many children who were coming in to
school hungry. Digging further into this and other stories from
conversations, St Marks realised that there were many children
across the city of MK who were relying on their school for
breakfast and lunch, but who then had nothing to eat at home
each evening.

Prompted by this, and research from MK Community Foundation, St Marks began running "Make Lunch" in schools across MK (including Fishermead) where hot lunches were served throughout school holidays to families who would otherwise struggle to eat. Over time, this evolved into St Marks Meals. Now, we are able to help struggling families on any day of the year, not just school holidays.

Schools and childrens' centres throughout the CPPC area now store boxes packed with ingredients for an evening meal along with a recipe card with easy



instructions to create a tasty dinner with the ingredients provided. Staff can give them to children in their care anytime. They are for families who find themselves unable to put food on the table for any reason.

Angie Row, of St Marks Meals told us "all parents find dinner-time stressful sometimes, having to be inventive, cooking something the kids will eat and doing so on budget...but at the moment, many of us are struggling with this more than ever. Covid, loss of jobs and higher prices make it incredibly hard. We don't want any adult to have to look into an empty food cupboard without the ability to feed their children that evening. We really want our kids to go to school without having to worry about feeling hungry or if they will be hungry again tonight".

Thanks to the support of Campbell Park Parish Council, schools across this region have been able to open store-cupboards of meals boxes.

Concerns about Road Safety Issues in Woolstone

There are concerns in Woolstone about road safety, the relaxed peaceful area appears to be under threat.

Residents in Woolstone have noticed an increase in traffic during lockdown with the area becoming a destination with people visiting the lovely greenspaces and play areas, with their links to the Ouzel Valley Park, Willen Lake and The Grand Union Canal.

In addition some traffic uses
Pattison Lane as a rat run
between Chaffron Way and Childs
Way, including many Heavy Goods
Vehicles which appear to be lost
or following a misguided SatNav.

There is also a blind bend at the junction between the link road between the two roads, opposite the old school. This dangerous corner will be considerd as part of improving road safety in Woolstone, very often traffic going around the bend end up on the wrong side of the road.

Local resident and retired Highways Engineer commented " The existing junction would fail a highways safety audit, if it was considered under current Highway Regulations. This junction needs to be re-designed.".

There is a concern that not every road user is adhering to the speed limits of 30mph, there have been a number of near misses and indeed one resident was knocked off their bike.

Parents of local children who walk and cycle in the area and to and from school are very concerned that things are becoming so



dangerous.

One parent said; "I am worried when the boys leave the house just to cross the road outside, it's so dangerous"

With the easing of lockdown, there are concerns that the roads will become even busier when the popular local pubs The Barge and The Cross Keys reopen fully. A number of residents have taken the initiative to make the roads in Woolstone safer for the community and any visitors.

Another resident said; "I was almost mowed down by a car on Newport Road when we were walking the dog, if my partner had not pulled me back from the road, I dread to think what could have happened"

We need to change things now to prevent any serious accidents and reduce the chance of injuries and possible deaths.

Another resident living on Newport Road said; "It's a real problem with cars speeding along the road here"

"The bend in the road where Pattison Lane merges into Newport Road is dangerous. Vehicles travelling along Newport Road and vehicles travelling round the bend, both drive on the wrong side of the road in opposite directions. Woolstone resident and Highways Design Engineer."

The proposal is to reduce the speed limits and make most of Woolstone a 20mph zone. The idea is to target the two main arterial roads Pattison Lane and Newport Road as the primary locations for the reduced speed limit

We are in talks with Milton Keynes Council who are supportive of the proposals and may introduce additional traffic calming measures following a study of traffic speeds in the area.

Campbell Park Parish Council supported the proposals at a recent meeting of the Planning, Infrastructure and Transport Committee.

SCHOOL REPORTS





Last term was another eventful term with the majority of children remaining at home, accessing remote learning whilst children of key workers or who may be vulnerable attended school. Remote learning and live lessons were a new experience for the teachers and pupils alike and something that evolved since 4th January. The pupils and families were amazing during this time, rising to this new challenge.

We are extremely grateful to members within our community who kindly **donated laptops** and devices which we have been able to utilise to support children with limited technology to access their learning. It is this generosity and kindness that makes being part of the Oldbrook community great!

This term we also extended our Nursery offer welcoming children who are entitled to 30 hours free childcare. The children have flourished and are enjoying more time in the setting to explore and play and building on their social, emotional and academic development to support them when they start school in September.

The staff couldn't wait to welcome all our children back to school on Monday 8th March. It was a day of celebrating all being

back together again. As a school we pride ourselves on the relationships that we build with children and families and the high-quality early years education that we offer.

In the **Foundation Stage** this term, the children have immersed themselves in all things cold and wintry, using their senses to explore the frost, ice and snow. They have read 'The Tales of Jack Frost' and used their imagination to create magical, icy settings. The children had fun doing lots of icy science experiments and made ice bubbles. They also found out about how hedgehogs hibernate in winter and compared this to how animals adapt to the cold in the Arctic.

Children in **Year 1** learned all about different fairy tales. In Science they explored light and dark carrying out their own experiments and investigating objects which are transparent, opaque, shiny and dull. The children have enjoyed developing

their creative skills through making sculptures, producing art about different fairy tales and sewing.

This term in **Year 2** the children all became trainee space astronauts! They learnt all about the Solar System, the history of space and found out about famous historical figures who changed astronomy forever. They even emailed NASA to try and find answers to the many questions they had about current space missions and can't wait until they reply!






Since the return to school, the children have been participating in lots of exciting learning! **Year 3** have particularly enjoyed learning about the artist *Sonia*

THE LEWIS WENMAN MEMORIAL BENCH

Lewis Wenman was 17 years old when he died in November 2020, three months before his eighteenth birthday. The shock and outpouring of grief at the loss of such a young man was palpable and deeply felt.

Living in Oldbrook with his mother, he attended Jubilee Wood School in Fishermead and the Milton Keynes Academy. Up to the six month period preceding his death he lived in Springfield where he was fatally stabbed.

Campbell Park Parish Council have purchased a bench in his memory to be sited on Oldbrook Green. A plaque from his mother will be placed on the bench.

Nana Oguntola, the Chairman of the Communication Committee stated:

'This was a sad event for the Parish and in particular the young people in this Parish. We want to make sure that this Parish remembers Lewis and make the statement that he is not just a statistic to us. His life mattered and his loss is deeply felt'.

Terry Baines who is the Chairman of Campbell Park Parish Council said:

'The Council wholeheartedly supports this idea. A young man from our Parish has tragically lost his life and we cannot change that but we can support having the bench there for his family, friends and the entire Parish

to remember Lewis. Hopefully it will go further to deter young people from using knives'.

Lewis's mum stated that she was grateful to the Parish Council for helping her to keep the memory of her beloved son alive.



Willen Hospice's Relaxing Remedy

The charity cares for people with life-limiting illnesses and supports relatives and friends who are facing the death of someone important in their lives. As well as providing care in people's homes and in their In-Patient Unit beside Willen Lake; they offer a range of outpatient services to help people's emotional, social and physical wellbeing. One such service is complementary therapies, which provides a range of treatments, including reflexology, Reiki and aromatherapy, for patients, relatives and carers.

Jo Stewart, Complementary Therapy Lead at Willen Hospice, explains the positive impact of the grant on patients:

"The funding has provided equipment to help with therapies that relax people who are going through an extremely difficult and stressful time, which has been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

People from across our charity have been referred for treatments to help with their overall wellbeing, reduce stress levels and to



manage their symptoms. The Campbell Park Parish Council's grant funded equipment, such as aroma sticks and rollerballs, for these sessions. These included items we can give to patients so they can continue aromatherapy treatments at home, using the techniques they are shown during appointments."

Budget Planning and Achievements

February witnessed the completion of the Springfield pub purchase. With the site due to become home to our Parish Community Hub, the move represents a massive step towards our number one strategic goal.



Perimeter Fence

At the same time, the new perimeter fence was installed at Willen allotments. The project was put forward in 2017, and placed in the forward budget for delivery in 2021.

New Social Housing

March saw Fishermead residential development sites 6 and 7 from our Neighbourhood Plan cleared ahead of new social housing imminently being built on the site.

Landscape Service

We are fast approaching the end of the first year of the devolved landscaping service, a service that we have already invested over £300,000 in. During a meeting with our Landscape Manager we discussed the draft spring/summer programme.

These are all signs that our shift in 2016 to long-term planning and budgeting is showing yet more dividends.

Landscape Update

Campbell Park Parish Council

It has now been a year since the Parish took on the mammoth task of managing the landscape of the Parish from Milton Keynes Council.

When we took over the service it was at a time when we had just gone into the first lockdown. This caused some minor problems to begin with, but we were able to overcome them and over the last year despite restrictions we have been able to make some positive progress with the condition of the landscape.

Over the last year we have learnt a great deal about the condition of the various wards of the Parish and have a clearer understanding of what we will need to do for the landscape to be in a condition that would be sustainable and allow us to maintain all the Parish to a reasonable standard.

Planned Program

We have planned a program of works for the summer from looking at the work we undertook last year to make sure we have the most efficient and effective grass cutting program and have time to address the weeds and sightlines through the summer months as well.

We have just completed our winter maintenance program. Within this program we tried to address some of the larger more challenging areas first. As we progress in the programs for the

following winters, we can build on the work we have already undertaken. By planning our work and doing work in the way we are we will be able to see more easily what is working and what we may need to readdress.

Prioritising

Through the winter we have been addressing many of the enquiries that have come to us. Through this process we have had to prioritise all work as to the impact it has on the residents. Currently, we are looking at the areas which impact the wider community. As we progress, we can start to focus our effort more on areas to undertake specific projects.

We have found much that we expected and much that surprised us as the team undertook the task of tidying up the Parish. We were not surprised to see many shrubs and plants that were in a poor condition either through lack of maintenance or due to them being past there best and starting to go into decline. We were surprised as to what we found hidden in amongst the shrubbery which was a great deal of rubbish and dumped items.

Finding and dealing with this can hinder us and will increase the amount of time we need to spend tidying an area so we do less than we would ideally like.

Resident's Help

I would urge residents to help us with this process of keeping the Parish tidy and to look to dispose of rubbish and waste material in the correct way.

We continue to work hard to make the landscape better for all. We will shortly be consulting with you on our winter programme as part of our annual Budget/ Precept consultation and would encourage you to complete the questionnaire to help us draw up the programme of work.



Grants

In January a grant of £1000 was awarded to **St Mary Magdalene Church** in Willen to purchase benches, for the use of all the community, to be installed as part of their church yard reclamation project.

In February, Bedford & Milton Keynes *Waterway Trust* were awarded a grant of £1000 as a contribution towards the Milton Keynes Community Boat Set-Up project. Milton Keynes Community Boat Set-Up project is to help equip the new 12-passenger MK Community Boat with everything it needs on board prior to the planned start of public cruising in June 2021. The new Milton Keynes Community Boat will run trips on the Grand Union. It is currently in construction as a result of work by the Bedford & Milton Keynes Waterway Trust

Community Hub

Campbell Park Parish Council

It has been a long-held aspiration of the Parish Council to provide a centre for residents of all ages to access a range of services and leisure activities, and to accommodate our Councillors and staff, in a purpose-built welcoming environment.

Those of you that have visited us in Fishermead, will know that we currently operate from a former residential property, with a series of small rooms spread over four floors. Although the property initially suited our needs, it no longer does so and restricts the services and activities we can offer you, at the same time the layout and design mean that accessibility can be a real issue.

Although we have two community centres, one in Springfield and the other in Oldbrook, both are in constant use with nursery schools during the day, private hire in the evenings and faith groups and private parties at the weekend. This means that we are unable to deliver new services and activities from them.

Over the years we have explored a number of improvement

options, including extending our current premises, and developing one of the buildings on Oldbrook Green. But these have proved unfeasible, with one of the underlying causes being that we do not own the properties. Of the land and properties that we do own, (Fishermead and Woolstone Sports Grounds, and the Springfield community centre), after lengthy consideration and external advice, we had to accept that none of the sites were suitable.

In late 2018, the Springfield Public House came on to the market. It had not traded as a pub for a number of years and the then owner had plans to develop the site for housing, but a covenant on the site restricted its use to community use. We were very keen for the site to have a longterm future as a community asset, and following a lengthy negotiation, have now purchased the site. The existing building will be demolished and out of the ashes, a phoenix will arise in the shape of the new Parish Community Hub – the work to make this happen, starts now, and we want you to be a part of this. To start the process, and as part of our annual budget

consultation, we will be asking you for your ideas on what the important elements of the new Hub will be, as well as the services and benefits it will bring to our area. The new Hub will be located in the centre of our area and accessible to all, so we would greatly appreciate residents from all of the estates getting involved.

This is an exciting time for us all and we want you to be involved in the planning of a Community Hub that will meet your needs.

Community Centres in our Parish

Willen Pavilion

Willen Pavilion is situated in the heart of Willen and provides a bright and airy hall, with an external terraced area, a modern kitchen and a separate meeting room with integral kitchen facilities.

The Pavilion is available for hire for weddings, parties, social events, business meetings and community activities.

Since its opening in 2008, the Pavilion has been used extensively by the local community and other organisations for sport, leisure and educational purposes.

The spacious main hall has capacity for 80 people seated or 120 for dancing. There are plenty of tables and chairs available for your use.

The modern, well equipped kitchen, which adjoins the hall, contains a cooker, fridge and dishwasher. A kettle, hot water urn, crockery and cutlery are provided.

A separate meeting room can accommodate 24 people seated and has integrated kitchen facilities to provide hot drinks and refreshments.

Our premises are fully wheelchair accessible and our toilet facilities include a disabled toilet.

Willen Pavilion has a free car park at the rear of the building.



Woolstone Community Holy Trinity Church

The Little Woolstone Church goes back to the 13th Century and is a listed building along with the church grounds. When the church was closed down in 1969 and made redundant, the Development Corporation under the New Towns Act agreed with the residents of Woolstone to carry out works so that the residents would have a Community Centre in Woolstone.

The work included the removal of the church pews, wooden floor laid over the existing floor tiles, new heating system and installation of a kitchen and toilets. External repairs were carried out to the stone work, repairs to the roof and new roof tiles. Repairs were made to the Bell Tower which still has 3 no bells, dating back to the 16th century. The bells were made at Drayton Parslow. The cladding around the Bell Tower was also renewed. Access to the Bell Tower, which is inside the building, is by a ladder which has a date of 1822 on the side. The bells cannot be rung because of their weight and one has a section missing. There is a disabled car park to the side of the building with a side access to the rear door. Inside the Chancel there are two plaques on the wall for three men killed in the second world war and for Dorothy Pattison who was a schoolmistress at the local school in 1861 and then went on to become famous as Sister Dora.

The church yard was tidied up with some headstones moved to the boundary wall. Records of the church and the location of the graves are held in the diocese of Oxford and the maintenance of the headstones & graves is with Milton Keynes Council who now own the building. The church has a lease on the chancel end and services are held on Sundays and other religious days. With the repairs to the building being completed the Development Corporation then spoke to the residents of Woolstone to use the building as a community centre along with the church. The Corporation then helped to draw up the documentation on how a Management Committee would be able to run the building as a charity and a registered company. The Church was opened on the 18th of November 1982. The old community Hall, next to the school building was sold off and removed now forms the car park next to Woolstone green and the Barge car park.

Planning Application for Major Development East of M1

The Consultation is open for comments on the planning application in relation to the proposed new neighbourhood east of the M1. The boundary for the development site borders Willen, Newport Pagnell, Moulsoe and Pineham.

The development has been identified within Milton Keynes Council's Local Plan (Plan:MK) as the Milton Keynes East Strategic Urban Extension and aims to provide approximately 5000 new homes, employment, infrastructure and open space.

The planning application seeks outline planning permission

for "a large-scale mixed-use urban extension (creating a new community) comprising: residential development; employment including business, general industry and storage/distribution uses; a secondary school and primary schools; a community hub containing a range of commercial and community uses; a new linear park along the River Ouzel corridor; open space and linked amenities; new redways, access roads and associated highways improvements; associated infrastructure works; demolition of existing structures"

It also seeks permission for

"detailed element for strategic highway and multi-modal transport infrastructure, including: new road and redway extensions; a new bridge over the M1 motorway; a new bridge over the River Ouzel; works to the Tongwell Street corridor between Tongwell roundabout and Pineham roundabout including new bridge over the River Ouzel; alignment alterations to A509 and Newport Road; and associated utilities, earthworks and drainage works"

A number of residents of Willen have raised concerns about the development and its potential impact. A public meeting has been arranged by Cllr Sam Crooks at 7pm, **Tuesday 29th June**, venue to be confirmed, (see our Facebook page) with the developer to find out more information and to discuss their concerns.

The development includes major works to the highway network with an extension to the grid network. The proposals include changes to the grid road layout with the dualling of the V11 Tongwell Street on the eastern boundary of Willen. Proposals include connecting the new development to the existing grid system to the V11 via a bridge over the M1 with a roundabout at Carlton Gate.
