#### CPPC COMMUNITY HUB UPDATE

Campbell Park Parish Council



Since our last update to you we have submitted the Reserved Matters planning application to Milton Keynes Council.

Having received approval to our Outline Planning Application in November last year, this application presents MK Council with our detailed proposals which include the proposed site layout, appearance and landscaping plans. MK Council are now considering these proposals and we await their decision, which we hope to receive any day now!

Since the demolition of the old pub building, we have commissioned further site surveys and ground investigations. The results of these assessments will help to inform the specifications required of the building contractors when the construction begins and will help to ensure we don't get any costly surprises when the work gets going.

We have also recently started the process to identify potential construction partners. We have invited interested contractors to provide us with a package of information which includes details of their experience with similar projects, their financial status/stability, their approach to sustainability as well as providing us with references. We will use this information to carry out an assessment of each contractor to enable us to narrow down the field of companies who will be invited to submit comprehensive tenders later in the year.

Over the coming months we will also be exploring external grant funding opportunities that will help us keep the borrowing required to deliver this project as low as possible.

Currently we remain on target to start the construction of the Community Hub in the spring 2023.

#### POTENTIAL NAME CHANGE

The creation of the new Hub presents us with the opportunity to re-brand ourselves as a Community Council and at the same time address a historical misnomer!

Becoming a Community Council best reflects the services we offer and the future direction and objectives of the Council, with an increasing focus of meeting the changing needs of residents. Removing the Parish connection eliminates the confusion of some who believe that we are in some way connected to the Church. The inclusion in our name of Campbell Park is an inaccurate reference which does not reflect the changes made in the 2012 boundary review, which saw the area transferred to CMK Town Council.

With the above in mind, we have made an in-principle decision to change our name to Secklow Community Council, something we want to consult you on and hear your views. Secklow is a reference used extensively across Milton Keynes, ranging from street names to bars. Some of you will be aware of the location of the Secklow Hundred mound at the rear of the central library and the role that it played in the historical administration of what has become Milton Keynes. Changing our name to Secklow Community Council will be a nod to our origins, at the same time its non-geographic nature future proofs us against any area changes that might come about because of a future boundary review.

One thing that we are mindful of in making this proposed change is the potential cost to residents. For this reason, we will look to re-brand physical assets at the point that they are replaced rather than overnight, that way we will keep costs to a minimum. Thankfully changes to websites, letterheads and emails are easily made due to their electronic nature. We do not intend to make wholesale changes and will look to retain our logo, including the familiar tree emblem.

We will spend the next few months listening to your views and taking onboard any feedback from MK Council, before we make a final decision towards the end of the year — please email admin@campbell-park.gov.uk or attend and get involved in one of our meetings where the name change will be discussed www.campbell-park.gov.uk/calendar



#### **LANDSCAPING REPORT**

Campbell Park Parish Council

The start of the spring/summer season brought our usual rapid growth spurt across the Parish, from both grass and shrubs.

We switched to our summer maintenance programme in April and the mowers have been on a continuous cutting cycle across all of the estates, whilst another team have been strimming/weed control and ticking off smaller jobs from resident enquiries.

In July the grass growth rate slowed down, so for a couple of weeks we took a break from the mowing cycle and the full team were out working on clearing the sightlines (at road junctions), inaccessible footpaths and attending to issues raised by residents. During the spring/summer months there are restrictions in place from March-August to protect bird nesting. This means that we are not able to do any cutting back until the autumn/ winter months, unless it poses a risk to safety.

Also, at this time of year in the shrub beds we often come across ground wasp and bee nests. If you see a halfcompleted job, it usually means we



have disrupted the nest and there is no working with an angry swarm. The nests are usually active up until the first frost and this is when we will return to finish the job.

#### **JUBILEE TREES**

During June we received ten trees to be planted as part of the Queens Platinum Jubilee Green Canopy project. Each estate was allocated two each. If you see them on your estate with a green water bag attached to the bottom of the trunk, we are encouraging residents to help with watering. If you are passing a tree or if you have one close by, it would be great if you could give them a drink.

Any amount of water is worthwhile, you can even use your dirty dish water (a little washing up liquid will do them no harm). It will really help them through these dry summer months.

#### **RFWILDING**

#### WHAT IS IT?

As you will have noticed, in various spaces across the Parish areas have been left to "rewild". This is to play our part in expanding biodiversity across the city.

The mini meadows allow Bumble bees to forage on nectar from clover, dandelions and other lawn 'weeds', solitary bees can find nesting spots amongst the long grasses, birds such as finches can be seen feasting on seedheads, and the mini jungle provides shelter and breeding grounds to help establish habitats for many invertebrates, mini beasts and mammals.

WHY?

Rewilding is a conservation effort to protect and restore the vast amounts of declining nature around us on both a local and global scale.

Our Parish, along with many other councils across the country, are taking a step back from mechanical interference and leaving selected areas solely to nature, so that it can re-establish and restore its natural eco system and re-introduce the local flora and fauna back to our local areas. It is one of several methods the United Nations have listed that will help achieve restoration of our natural ecosystems.

#### WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Sadly, nature in Britain is in serious trouble. Over the past few years half of our natural species are in decline and 15% threatened with extinction! Conservation areas and charities work hard to save and create wildlife but sadly the threat to our ecosystem needs far more intervention from

everybody, not just the small patches these organisations tend to. We are playing our part to compliment the wider works being done to conserve nature and help restore our support system which human life depends on.

We have already seen an abundance of wildlife in these areas; including hundreds of dragonflies & bumblebees, two species rapidly in decline.

We are keen to work with and hear the opinions of residents on areas you feel could be used for rewilding or areas you feel have not been suitable. This will be reviewed and taken into consideration when planning next year's rewilding areas. We will begin to cut the longer grass towards the end of July. This is when all the eggs will be hatched, and ground nesting animals are able to move on. It will be cut in stages allowing the insects/animals time to move on and will regenerate the growth for next year.



#### THE IMPORTANCE OF BEES

Bees have an important part to play in maintaining our planet. Where trees and woods are essential to filter our air, bees are vital to both pollinate the food that we need to survive and also pollinate many of the trees and flowers that provide habitats for wildlife.





## Luckily, it's not too late to help save the bees from extinction.

There are lots of things you can do to help protect these important creatures - most of which can be done from the comfort of your own garden.

Sadly, bee populations are in decline on a global scale as they face many threats, from habitat loss to the use of toxic pesticides. Many of the threats to bees share parallels with the threats to trees and woodland, so saving bees goes hand-in-hand with saving trees. If these threats aren't brought under control, we could be looking at a future without bees.



Bees favour a wide range of flowering plants, including foxglove, birdsfoot trefoil and red clover, which can be grown easily from seed.





#### Help a bee in need

Often during the summer months you may spot a solitary bee sitting unmoving on the ground. Whilst it is easy to presume it might be dead or dying, chances are it is actually exhausted and in need of a quick pick-me-up. You can help out a tired bee by mixing two tablespoons of white, granulated sugar with one tablespoon of water, placing it near the bee so it can help itself to this homemade energy drink.



Like most invertebrates, bees need shelter to nest and hibernate in. You can create your own shelter or buy a ready-made bee hotel – just hang it up in a sunny sheltered spot in your garden and watch bees filling the tubes during the spring and summer months.



#### Stop using pesticides

Pesticides are one of the key threats to bees, and so one way to help bees is to stop using them in your own garden. Some pests provide food for crucial pollinators, so leaving them to be controlled naturally is the best choice if you want to help save bees.


Councillor Greenwood was invited to attend the presentation event, which was held in June, where he was honoured to present some of the awards.




In **EFYS** the children have been learning all about addition and subtraction facts, using Numicon and part whole models to

### Jubilee Wood Primary School

In the last two years at Jubilee Wood Primary School, we have been busy launching a new exciting curriculum for all of our children to enjoy and to help them make the very best of themselves as they make their way into the world.

OFSTED praised us for our exciting curriculum in February this year and for the 'Outstanding' Personal Development that the children enjoy at our school. This week we received our first set of Y6 SATs results since the start of the pandemic - we were delighted to find that because of the new curriculum at Jubilee Wood, the standards our children are reaching are now higher than they are nationally! Our children can now read as well as the national average; our children write better than is typical nationally; and our children's maths is a mile above what children score nationally. In all of the subjects above, large numbers of children also achieved a 'Greater Depth', the highest grade possible. We already knew that the children are now performing on a completely different level at Jubilee Wood than they have ever done in the past, but it was great to have this recognised more widely!



The amazing talents of our Y6 children here at Jubilee Wood go beyond even their literacy and maths skills – last week our **Y6 football team came 3rd** in a Milton Keynes-wide football tournament that involved over 40 schools across the city.

Our team worked together showing great sportsmanship and made the school proud.

At Jubilee Wood, we want to give the children frequent opportunities to **broaden their experiences**. So, with this in mind, our older children went to a residential centre at **Caldecotte** for two nights recently where they got to



experience camping, sailing, kayaking, climbing, abseiling and caving amongst many other exciting things! Another year group has gone on a residential to **Northamptonshire** where they enjoyed outdoors activities in the beautiful countryside before staying there overnight. Meanwhile, most of our year groups have visited the beach at **Walton on** the Naze this summer, enjoying an incredible day playing on the lovely sandy beach, making sandcastles and splashing in the sea. We plan all of these activities so that the children's personal development continues to be 'outstanding' as OFSTED said, so that they add to their wider experiences and gain a better understanding of the exciting world in which we live.

At the end of this school year, we are looking to the birth of the new one in September, and we are already looking forward to the large number of new families that we will have the pleasure of serving. The school roll is currently close to **500 children**, and with all of the amazing things going on at Jubilee Wood, we expect that figure to grow and grow!
